## Old Testament 6

### POINTS TO EMPHASIZE:

- 1. Review <u>O.T. 6 Bible Fact Cards</u> (provided under "O.T. 6 Bible Facts" on curriculum Web site)
- 2. Use the activities and visuals from the lessons to help review.
- 3. Utilize the following questions to review each lesson.

#### Lesson 1: David the Shepherd; Psalm 23

- 1. Who was the king of Israel in the story? (Saul)
- 2. Why did God want to find a new king? (Because Saul had disobeyed Him many times)
- 3. Who did God send to look for a new king? (Samuel)
- 4. What was the name of the man Samuel went to see? (Jesse)
- 5. How many sons did Jesse have? (Eight)
- 6. Who was the son anointed by Samuel to be king? (David)
- 7. What did David look like? (Ruddy, bright-eyed, good-looking)
- 8. What was David's job? (He was a shepherd.)
- 9. What did David do while he was taking care of his father's sheep? (He wrote psalms and grew closer to God.)
- 10. Over how many tribes did David end up being king? (All 12)

#### Lesson 2: David and God Defeat Goliath

- 1. What did David do as a job while Saul was still king? (He was a shepherd.)
- 2. Who attacked Israel? (The Philistines)
- 3. Who was the Philistine giant who dared the Israelites to fight him? (Goliath)
- 4. What did Goliath say would happen if anyone could beat him in a fight? (The Philistines would be Israel's slaves.)
- 5. How tall was Goliath? (Six cubits and a span—about nine feet, nine inches)
- 6. How much did Goliath's armor weigh? (125 pounds)
- 7. Who accepted Goliath's challenge to fight? (David)



- 8. What weapons did David bring to the fight? (A sling and five stones)
- 9. How did David kill Goliath? (With the help of God, he hit him in the head with a stone from his sling.)
- 10. What does David's faith in this story show us? (That if we trust in God, He will help us)

#### Lesson 3: David Flees for His Life; David's Friendship with Jonathan

- 1. After David killed Goliath, what position did Saul give him? (In charge of the army of Israel and leading battles)
- 2. What made Saul angry and jealous of David? (The women sang songs that portrayed David as better than Saul.)
- 3. Who became David's best friend? (Jonathan, Saul's son)
- 4. What did David do for Saul when he was angry? (Played soothing music on his harp)
- 5. What did Saul do to David one day when Saul was angry? (Threw his spear at him)
- 6. When Saul was jealous, what did he try to do to David? (Kill him with a spear and by putting him in dangerous battles)
- 7. What did Saul offer David if he killed 100 Philistines? (His daughter, Michal)
- 8. Why did Saul make that deal? (He hoped David would be killed in the battle.)
- 9. How did Jonathan try to calm king Saul? (He told him that he did not have to fear David.)
- 10. What did Jonathan do for David? (He let him know if it was safe to come back home or if he should stay away.)

#### Lesson 4: David Spares Saul's Life

- 1. What was Saul doing out of anger and jealousy? (Hunting David so he could kill him)
- 2. To where had David fled? (The wilderness of Ziph)
- 3. How many men did David have? (600)
- 4. What happened when David and his men hid in the cave? (Saul came in the cave to relieve himself.)
- 5. What did David's men say to do when Saul came in the cave? (They told David to kill Saul.)
- 6. What did David do? (Cut off a piece of Saul's robe)
- 7. Why did David do this? (To show Saul that he could have killed him, but he spared him, instead)
- 8. Why did David spare Saul when he could have killed him? (David knew it was not right to kill the king anointed by God.)
- 9. What do David's actions in this story teach us? (To obey and respect authority, even when the authority makes wrong decisions)

#### Lesson 5: Foolish Nabal and Wise Abigail

- 1. What did David, his men, and their families need? (Food)
- 2. Who did David ask for food? (Nabal)
- 3. Was Nabal rich or poor? (Rich)
- 4. What did Nabal have that made him rich? (1,000 goats and 3,000 sheep)
- 5. Was Nabal a good or bad man? (A bad man, evil in all his doings)
- 6. What did Nabal say to the messengers David sent to ask for food? (He said, "No.")
- 7. What was David going to do to Nabal? (Destroy him and his entire house)
- 8. Who stopped David from doing this? (Abigail, Nabal's wife)
- 9. How did Abigail stop David? (She brought him food and said she was sorry for her evil husband.)
- 10. What did Nabal do when Abigail told him what she had done? (He became very sick and died ten days later.)

#### Lesson 6: David is Kind to Mephibosheth

- 1. What happened to King Saul and Jonathan? (They died in a battle with the Philistines.)
- 2. How did Saul die? (He killed himself by falling on his sword.)
- 3. Who of Saul's sons survived the battle? (Ishbosheth)
- 4. Who was Jonathan's son? (Mephibosheth)
- 5. When the country divided, who were the kings over each side? (People loyal to Saul had Ishbosheth as their king; everyone else had David.)
- 6. What happened to Ishbosheth? (He died after ruling for only two years.)
- 7. What did David remember after ruling for a few years? (His promise to Jonathan to show kindness to his family.)
- 8. Did David find any family? (Yes. Jonathan's son, Mephibosheth, was found.)
- 9. What was wrong with Mephibosheth? (He could not walk.)
- 10. What did David do for Mephibosheth? (Gave him Saul's land and let him eat at the King's table regularly)

#### Lesson 7: David and Bathsheba

- 1. Why was David in the palace? (He chose to stay there instead of going off to battle.)
- 2. To where did David take a walk? (He went to the roof of his palace.)
- 3. What did he see on another rooftop? (Bathsheba bathing)
- 4. Who was Bathsheba? (The wife of Uriah, one of David's best and bravest soldiers)
- 5. What should David have done? (Looked away and not thought about her)

- 6. What did David do with Bathsheba? (Committed adultery)
- 7. Who confronted David about his sin? (Nathan the prophet)
- 8. How did David react when he was confronted about his sin? (He was very sorry and asked God to forgive him.)
- 9. Did God forgive David? (Yes, but the consequences of David's sin would still take place)
- 10. What does this story teach us? (God always knows what we are thinking and doing, even when no one else sees, and there are always consequences for sin.)

#### Lesson 8: David Loves God's Word: Psalm 119

- 1. What is the longest book in the Bible? (Psalms)
- 2. How long is the book of Psalms? (150 chapters)
- 3. How many verses are in Psalm 119? (176)
- 4. What are some of the topics in Psalm 119? (Thanksgiving, fear and frustration, forgiveness, belief in God, etc.)
- 5. What did God tell his people to do with His Word? (Read it and teach it to their children and grandchildren)
- 6. What did the number "8" mean to God's people? (It meant "more than enough," or "abundance.")
- 7. What does it mean when God's Word is described eight ways? (It means God's Word is more than enough for life and godliness.)

#### Lesson 9: Absalom

- 1. Who was Absalom? (The third son a David)
- 2. What evil thing did Absalom do? (He killed his brother Amnon for mistreating his sister.)
- 3. How did David feel about Amnon's death? (He was very sad, but he was sadder for Absalom.)
- 4. Where did Absalom go after he killed his brother? (To his grandfather Geshur's kingdom)
- 5. How long did Absalom stay with his grandfather? (Three years)
- 6. When he came back, how long was it before David and Absalom spoke to each other? (Two years)
- 7. What evil thing did Absalom plan to do next? (Take the kingdom from David)
- 8. How did he gain supporters? (By "politic-ing" in the gates of the palace)
- 9. What happened to Absalom in the battle when he attacked David? (His head/hair got caught in a tree, and Joab killed him.)
- 10. What was David called? (A man after God's own heart)

#### Lesson 10: Solomon Becomes King; God's Promises to Solomon

- 1. After David died, who was going to be the next king of Israel? (David's son, Solomon)
- 2. What did David tell Solomon while he was dying? (To always obey God's Word if he wanted to be a good king)
- 3. When Solomon went to Gibeon to worship, how many burnt offerings did he sacrifice? (1,000)
- 4. What did God say when He appeared to Solomon in a dream? ("Ask! What shall I give you?")
- 5. What did Solomon ask from God? (An understanding heart to guide his people and to discern between good and evil)
- 6. Was God pleased with Solomon's request? (Yes)
- 7. What did God also give Solomon? (Riches, fame, and power)
- 8. How long was Solomon king of Israel? (Forty years)

#### Lesson 11: The Great Wisdom of Solomon; Queen of Sheba's Visit

- 1. How many songs and proverbs did Solomon write? (1,005 songs and 3,000 proverbs)
- 2. What was silver like in Israel since there was so much of it? (Like stones)
- 3. Who came to see Solomon to "test" his wisdom? (The Queen of Sheba)
- 4. What did the Queen of Sheba bring to Solomon? (A large caravan of expensive gifts)
- 5. Is true happiness in riches and fame? (No)
- 6. Where can real happiness be found? (In obeying God's Word)

#### Lesson 12: Solomon's Temple Built for, and Dedicated to, God

- 1. What did David do in preparation for constructing the Temple? (Gathered massive amounts of materials for building)
- 2. Did God let David build the Temple? (No, He told David to wait and let his son do it.)
- 3. How long had Solomon spent building his own palace? (13 years)
- 4. Where was the Temple going to be built? (Mount Moriah)
- 5. How big was the Temple? (Double the size of the Tabernacle)
- 6. How long did it take to build the Temple? (Seven years)
- 7. What terrible thing happened near the end of Solomon's life? (His wives turned his heart from God.)
- 8. How many wives did Solomon have? (700)
- 9. What does this story teach us? (How we worship is much more important than where we worship—John 4:21-24.)

#### Lesson 13: Solomon's Proverbs about the Tongue

- 1. Why is it wrong to make fun of people and call them names? (Because it can hurt their feelings, which is not loving; Matthew 7:12)
- 2. Why is it wrong to say bad words? (Because it could cause us to do evil things, Proverbs 17:20)
- 3. What are good ways to use our words? (To encourage, to teach, to pray, etc.)
- 4. What are wrong ways to use our tongues? (To curse, to lie, to gossip, etc.)
- 5. How powerful are our words? (Powerful enough to change lives)
